In the Blessings of Christmas-joy unspeakable and of Epiphany-joy witnessed,



Outreach Ministry Letter

Dear Ivey Congregation,

As we begin to anticipate the close of one year and the new beginning that comes with a new year, I want you to know I appreciate all that you have done in 2015 to spread God's love to others. Each time you have been asked to reach out to others you have not only answered the call but exceeded expectations.

From January 2015 till now we have been busy, we had accomplished at least one outreach program a month for 2015, some small and some much larger having a lasting impact on the community.

We started with a chili cook-off in January to cards for our veterans in February. We fed a group of 40+ men for CARITAS and had that many of us to turn out on a snowy night to help serve and fellowship with them. The soups and muffins and cake hit the spot. Ours eyes were opened through prayer walks to needs in the community: The Free Little Library being one of the first. I had never thought about children not having access to a library, I just jumped in the car with my children and we went to the library, what if I had not had a car. There are those who don't. When asked to raise the money to install one we raised it in one Sunday with \$.05 left over and stocked it with books. You did this! We asked you for Teen Bible because there is a need to get Bibles into the hands of teens and again you answered the call with funds to purchase 100 bibles. In our prayers it came to us to start a prayer shawls ministry 25 have been donated to date with us having given or mailed out 14 that have gone as far as Maryland and Northern VA to Tennessee.

Every stitch in each shawls or lap blanket blessing someone in need. We have been blessed and we have used those blessing to bless others. Through another prayer walk it was revealed that we had a wonderful ministry in the food pantry but we had the resources to take it a step further and bring those who have no transportation to get groceries for the month in our bus at a program offered by Chesterfield County at Elizabeth C. Scott Elementary. We are building relationships with our neighbors at the fire station and Harrowgate elementary School. We did cards and pork butts for the fire station and a basket of goodies for Harrowgate. From Fun and Faith to Trunk or Treat, we have answered God's call to share his love and grace with others as it has been shared with us. This is what "How to Reach New People" is about, building relationships with our community, sharing god's love and grace.

As we close out 2015, I want to say thank you to everyone who did any one of the things I have mentioned. In doing so you chose to be the hands and feet of Christ to the world. We are told to go and make disciples, this year through "How to Reach New People" I realized in order to do that we first need to build relationships.

In closing remember if what we do impacts one person, that was the person God knew was ready to be impacted. It is not up to us to judge who does and does not deserve God's grace (if that were the case I am sure a lot of us would not be deserving) it's up to us to share God's grace and love with others.







In fact, each and every member of the Ivey family can, in some way, participate in congregational care.

We must care for those who are present each Sunday, those who are shut-ins, and those who for reasons unknown are "missing." We must care for our neighbors. No one can be ignored. It is not only a Biblical mandate but an expression of our love for one another. Caring for others is the essence of the teachings of John Wesley through his system of small group meetings, bands and societies. A church that experiences congregational care will survive.


"Additionally, churches have valuable congregational care ministries that serve their own members." Congregational care can take many forms, and does so here at Ivey. We offer prayer as we lift up the needs of others on an hourly, daily or weekly basis. All have heard the testimonies that tell us the power of our prayers in the lives of others. We meet physical needs when we help care for the sick or homebound with our visits or when we take food to nurture the body.

💆 "Serving other church members can mean more than taking food and interceding in prayer." We take food, we pray and 🕏 *we say, "let me know if I can help." To be a true care giver, to really serve, we need to actually do something. We can meet emotional needs with phone calls to shut-ins or by sending greeting cards. We can show our love for one another with our hugs and greetings and "passing the peace" each Sunday morning-or wherever we see a friend from Ivey. We need to greet strangers and visitors in the same manner.

Congregational care takes place on Sunday morning as our teachers welcome each group and share the Gospel and God's love with those in the class. It takes place on Sunday evening as leaders and parents serve our Tadpoles, All Stars and Youth groups. It is evident when groups practice hand bells and choral arrangements to share with the congregation during A church services. Care for one another is displayed during the funeral receptions or pot luck meals in the social hall. Congregational care is shown as we share our space with the Child Development Center, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and with & those groups who wish to remain anonymous. Sharing joyfully with them is caring. The Fall Festival, Trunk or Treat, Yu Easter Egg hunt, Bible School and Choir Camp are activities where we share the love of Ivey with others. A new ministry begun by the Outreach Team is providing prayer shawls to those who need to feel our loving arms around them. On a weekly basis someone from Ivey is working in the food pantry or providing food to help stock the shelves.

As I read the "Interpreter" and wrote the words above, it became clear to me why I love Ivey. It is because we are congregational care givers--we are a congregation that reaches out to others with love and compassion. As Jesus said: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself." Matthew 22: 37-39.
